WVMRA, the united association which has nurtured the surface mining industry through good times and bad, has its roots in two regional organizations, the Southern West Virginia Surface Mining Institute, and the North Central West Virginia Surface Mining Association.

These two groups, with similar concerns and objectives, joined forces in the spring of 1966 to form the West Virginia Surface Mine Institute, with a small office in downtown Charleston. Leo Vecellio. Sr. was elected President.

O.V. "Dick" Vande Linde was named to serve as executive director of the new organization, and he hired a staff of one, namely Patty Bruce, whose seniority with the modern Association is matched by few and topped by no one.

Following the initial organization, the group was chartered with the Secretary of State as the West Virginia Surface Mine Association. By the time of the first general membership meeting in July of 1966, membership had grown to 46 companies, and the organization was drawing support from surface mine suppliers.

One trait common to the handful of companies that formed the Association was a sense of responsibility to the communities in which they lived and worked. Therefore, a major initial task was to transpose such a policy on the rest of the surface mining industry, and to carry the message to an untrusting public. The very existence of the industry today depended on it, and serves as ample testimony to the success of that effort.

Perhaps sensing the struggle ahead, the new Association plunged directly into the political arena, taking an active role in the 1967 revision of the State's reclamation law, and entering into a tripartite research agreement with the U.S. Forest Service and the West Virginia Department of Natural Resources.

The move to impede surface coal production peaked in 1971 with the introduction in the Legislature of a bill to abolish the industry outright. The proposal was voted down narrowly, but legislative compromise led to another severe revision of the reclamation law.

By now, the size and mission of the Association merited a bigger staff, and in rapid succession, the office was moved to larger quarters, Mary Anne Steele (now with 15 years service) was hired as bookkeeper, Ben Lusk joined the staff in a public relations capacity, Dan Gerkin became news director, and the name was changed to the West Virginia Surface Mining and Reclamation Association.

An extensive public relations campaign was launched, complete with a movie, press tours of reclaimed areas, a speakers bureau, a ladies' auxiliary, and the founding of Green Lands. Membership had reached nearly 200 companies.

The annual "Reclamation Awards" were established to reward and publicize the outstanding work then being pioneered by West Virginia operators.

By 1972, the corner was turned on industry survival. West Virginia led the nation in acres reclaimed, and the gubernatorial candidate favoring abolition was soundly defeated. Membership swelled to

In 1973, Ben Lusk became executive director, and the Association

turned its attention to technological advancement, as well as expansion of the membership, for which Terry Iden was hired as membership services director.

During this period, WVSMRA companies developed and perfected the most innovative mining techniques that the industry had yet seen, steep slope haulback and mountaintop removal, both of which utilized the "controlled placement" theory of overburden removal to maximize mineral recovery, and to facilitate effective reclamation.

In 1974, the Association initiated the West Virginia Mining Symposium, which continues today as the best bargain available in the dissemination of mining and reclamation information. That year also saw the creation of a technical services division, headed by new staff member John Sturm.

In a reorganizational move, Ben Lusk became president of the Association, and Dan Gerkin vice president, with a chairman to be elected annually from the membership. Headquarters were moved again, this time to the present location on Kanawha Boulevard, near the State Capitol. Cindy Jennings joined the staff in 1975, as news and information director.

The passage of national surface mining legislation in 1977 ushered in a new era for WVSMRA. Ben Lusk left the staff to begin a national organization, the Mining and Reclamation Council.

He was replaced by Ben Greene, the original chief of reclamation for the State Department of Natural Resources, whose contacts and knowledge of government/industry relations were to prove invaluable during the turbulent years of implementing federal legislation. Bill Raney. Greene's longtime associate at DNR, was named vice-president that

Though the threat to survival was less distinct, the period of the late 1970's represented a return to the decade before, when the battle for reasonable regulation was at its hottest. Largely through the efforts of the Association and its members, West Virginia, both industry and government, was given its due recognition as leader and innovator, and the difficult transition from total state regulation, to state/federal dual regulation, and back to state "primacy" in regulation, was successfully com-

Throughout the 1970's, 18 major pieces of federal legislation were enacted which directly affected the coal industry. Though each took its toll on production and employment, the vitality and tenacity of West Virginia operators enabled the industry to survive the decade of change to face the challenges of the 1980's.

The Association, as well, has risen to the challenge of the new decade with innovative programs. Since 1980, an annual trip to Washington D.C. has been scheduled in conjunction with a Board of Directors meeting, to establish a closer relationship with the state's congressional delegation. Green Pages, a membership services directory, was begun that year to further the cooperative relationship between WVMRA coal producers and associate members, suppliers of goods and services. Also in 1980, the Association agreed to co-sponsor the

West Virginia Surface Mine Drainage Task Force to seek and share new technology in dealing with the problem of acid drainage.

In 1981, we launched another new publication, the West Virginia Coal Bell, to address the non-member segment of the industry. In 1984, the Mountaineer Guardian Awards were established to promote and recognize mine safety.

Last year, the Association altered its name once again, this time to recognize the growing relationship and interdependence of surface and underground

Throughout its history, the Association has been blessed with an abundant store of resources, in the form of its membership, which is the strength of any successful trade organization. Coal companies have been quite visible in this effort, but much of what WVMRA has accomplished would not have been possible without the active support and participation of the Associate membership, those companies whose livelihood is directly linked to coal production.

In the early days, the Association was forced to make do with determination and ability, and those qualities served the industry well. But in 1986, as we celebrate our 20th Anniversary, WVMRA can add experience and reputation to its formula for success, as we prepare to meet the unknown challenges which surely lie ahead.






Company Pride




